- to take time to experience the waiting, to recognise that sometimes the best things cannot be obtained instantly;

May I take this opportunity to wish you a meaningful journey through Advent you will have to wait for, anticipate and expect the festive greeting at a later stage - it is yet to be prepared.

The Silent Sermon


Luke 2:8-20

The comment was made several years ago in one of my churches, “Do you realise that we have a silent sermon in the Church?” I looked puzzled, but that’s not unusual for me, and the comment continued that “The Christmas tree is blocking out the view of Christ.” In one of the windows in the Church was a picture of Christ the Good Shepherd. There are many today, who will be running around doing the last minute things, and such will be the rush that those tasks will block out any view of Christ. The story is told of two ladies who were out shopping for Christmas cards, when one of the ladies exclaimed, “Look, they’re even trying to bring religion into Christmas!”

On that first Christmas Day, it was the shepherds who saw the Christ child first. They were common, ordinary people like you and me. Their job was guarding the sheep just outside of Bethlehem. Because of the nature of their occupation, it was difficult for them to observe all of the rules and regulations of the Mosaic Law. They were looked down upon, and excluded from the company of those who were allowed into the Temple courts.



The news of Christ’s birth was not given to the priests, the Scribes, or the rulers, but to lowly shepherds. As they were in the fields keeping watch over their flocks, the word of the Lord came to them, a word of courage, in verse 10 they are told, “Do not be afraid.” I wonder what it is that concerns us? The word that the angels brought was one of good news, and the words that we receive from God’s Word are words that give courage to the fearful and discouraged. God knows what is happening in our lives, and He says to us, “Do not be afraid.”

The Silent Sermon Part 2

In these verses, we also have a word of good news, again in verse 10, “I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people.” The good news of God is that joy is available to all people, God does not want us to have a limited joy; He wants us to have great joy. The word great is the word megas, from where we get words such as megaton, a power that is to our minds limitless. The joy that is available from God is also limitless.

In verse 11, we have a word of hope, “Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you.” The people of Jesus’ day were looking for a Saviour from the tyranny of the Roman authorities; but they missed out, because that was not Jesus’ mission first time around.

Finally, in verses 11, 12 and 15, there is an individual word, the word of God may have come to the crowd, but it was pointed at individuals. We read, “I bring you”; “has been born to you”; “This will be a sign to you.” The Word of God can only be effective when it becomes personal, and we accept it as a gift from God for ourselves.

The shepherds went back to their fields and their sheep, not in silence, but glorifying and praising God for all that they had seen and heard. The journey of the shepherds to the birthplace of the Christ child began with a step of faith, they heard the Word of God and they responded with action, they took a step of faith, based on the information that they had received from the angels. For us, I hope that this Christmas we might pause to see the Christ child and receive Him into our hearts and lives, and none of the activities will block Him out. I must stop, but the silent sermon speaks on...



Boxes of Hope Torrisholme Methodist Church November 2021

The Theme of our service led by Rev Roy Burley today, November 7th 2021, was HOPE.

It was for us a memorable service in two ways.....

- (1) that we at TMC were able to share worship for the first time as joint members of the Morecambe Methodist Cluster, all with a common aim, namely to worship God and to bring others to Faith here in the local area, a Faith which declares "Jesus is Lord" and
- (2) memorable in that we were able to dedicate 103 Boxes of Hope destined for children in Romania.



This number (far exceeding our 2020 total), was thanks to a large number of willing workers knitting hats, scarves, cuddly toys etc and lovingly assembling boxes for months, in the lead up to today. We were especially blessed this year by large and generous donations from friends unable to fill a box, but committed to helping poor children. Their money enabled us to buy more expensive items like tooth paste & brushes and helped to cover the £2 needed towards carriage costs.

In case any member of the large congregation were in any doubt as to the Hope these boxes bring, we were further helped to understand by watching a power point presentation showing children in Romania receiving their gifts in previous years.....a moving tribute in itself.

We both felt a great deal of pride and encouragement seeing so many Boxes of Hope and of being part of a service in which so many worshippers were celebrating the Hope we have in Jesus, especially with the fruits of Cop26 (or lack of them) uppermost in our mind as we contemplated the future of our children and of the millions of children worldwide who have so little of Hope to cling to.

May we all be encouraged to see in Jesus not only the light of the world, but to accept that He and He alone is the only true source of Hope we have. Let us therefore rejoice in this Hope, for as we sang in our closing Hymn. "Joy to the world, the Lord is come".

Alleluia!!

Let us RE-USE what TV is putting into every home, and all ADVERTISE the real meaning of Christmas and the Gift of Love for the world.

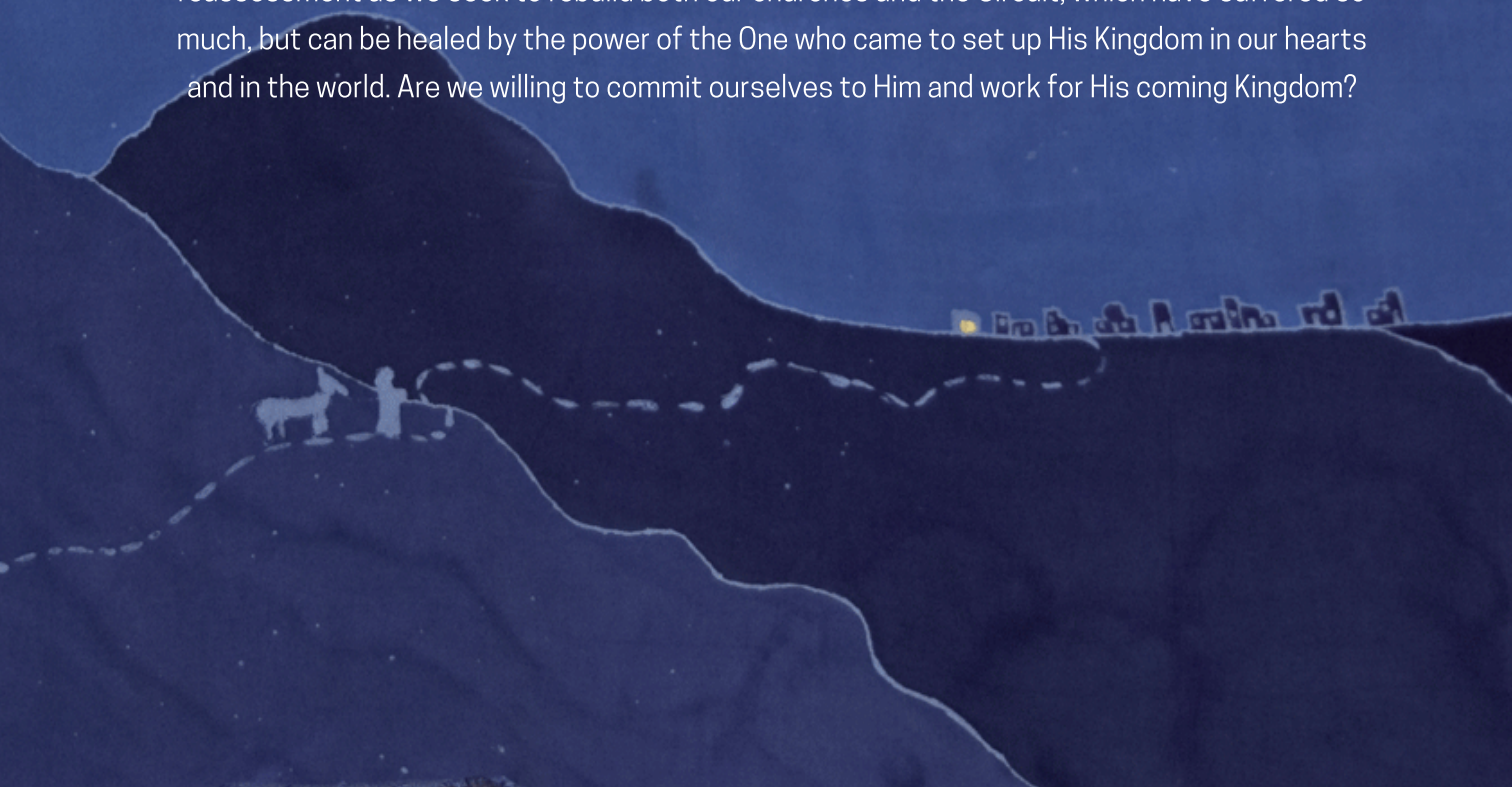
Advent

Worship Leader Training

Do you feel called to be involved in leading worship in your local church? To help prepare, plan and lead worship on a Sunday or during the week.

As we adapt to the post-pandemic context, we are discovering that our churches are facing a variety of different challenges and opportunities - one such thing is how we oversee our worship. If you feel that God is prompting you to be involved, talk to your Minister, an existing Local Preacher or Worship Leader. If you feel that someone in your church is called by God to be involved, speak to them - perhaps you are the person that God wants to use to encourage them to get involved.

We will explore topics such as: WHAT IS A WORSHIP LEADER? UNDERSTANDING WORSHIP; WHAT A WORSHIP LEADER NEEDS TO BE ABLE TO DO; PRAYER AND INTERCESSION; THE AGES OF WORSHIP; ARTS & TECHNOLOGY IN WORSHIP; LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS.

We are planning to have the training at one of the churches, but we also want it to be available online using Zoom, for those who cannot attend in-person - and if we can deal with the technical challenges, we might be able to have 2 or 3 churches 'hosting' a zoom session - so that people can attend somewhere a little closer than the 'main venue' (if that is too far to travel). Those possibilities will be dependent upon who wants to be involved and where they are located.

We are planning to have about 6 or 7 sessions at some point after Christmas - but we want to know what would be best for the participants:

- which day of the week would be best?
- what time of day - morning, afternoon, evening?
- how often - weekly? fortnightly? monthly?
- your location?
