




Praying with Hymns

Introduction

This booklet is intended as a guide for those who want to use hymns as prayers. You might be preparing to lead worship at a church or event without music. Maybe you've been asked to lead prayers and are anxious about what to say. You might need help to find the right words in a pastoral situation. Or perhaps you're someone who loves the poetry of the hymn book and wants to explore it further.

For many of us, hymns are hugely significant, especially those sung at important milestones in our lives.

As Methodists we have always 'sung our faith'. Hence the title of our hymn book, which is authorised and can be trusted to reflect Methodist theology. The hymns of John and Charles Wesley came about at a time when most 'Methodists' were not welcome in the parish church where the liturgy was taking place. The hymns of Charles, in particular, enabled them to learn, sing and recite their theology with the aid of memorable tunes.

Reading hymns as poetry enables us to really focus on the words and what they mean for our relationship with God without worrying about whether we're singing in tune!

In this booklet you will find various categories containing lists of reference numbers for *Singing the Faith* hymns that are particularly appropriate for use as prayers. Of course, this is quite subjective and you may well want to add your own ideas, or use a hymn at another time than the one suggested. That's fine.

All you need is a copy of *Singing the Faith* and the relevant licences if you're projecting the words on a screen. If you're not sure what you need, all the information can be found on the Singing the Faith Plus website, www.methodist.org.uk/our-faith/worship/singing-the-faith-plus. However you use these hymns, don't forget to mention the name of the writer when you introduce them.

Praying with Hymns was first developed as a resource for use locally in the East Solent and Downs Circuit of the Methodist Church. It has been well received, and has opened the eyes of many to the versatility of hymns when adapted for spoken prayer. Now the wider Church will also be able to benefit from discovering the treasures of the original hymn book in this way, as well as new hymns available online.

Using hymns as prayers: some ideas

This is a resource designed to be picked up and used quickly. In all likelihood you will skim through a few possibilities before arriving at something that seems to fit your purpose. As you're turning the pages of *Singing the Faith*, if you spot a few other hymns to add to the list for next time, so much the better!

But as you make your choices, you may also think: "That's a lot of words!" or "How can I involve others in this?"

The following are just a few ideas:

- If one lone verse jumps out at you, just use that. Be sure to say who wrote it and where it comes from, though!
- If the hymn has a chorus, you could ask the congregation to pick up their hymn books and join in with that.
- If there is repetition in the hymn you could ask the congregation to join in. (For example, the Easter hymn "Christ the Lord is risen today" contains repeated Alleluias that sound even more dramatic, celebratory and meaningful if taken up responsively by the congregation. Another good example is the Singing the Faith Plus hymn "[God called you, Jesus, into Jordan's deep](#)", with its repeated line, "We'll walk with you".)
- You could split the congregation in half and ask one side to read the odd verses and the other the even verses. (You might even invite two sides of a congregation to turn towards each other, offering alternative verses of a hymn to each other as a gift or a blessing.)
- There are many ways of dividing up a hymn text between solo readers, groups and/or sections of the congregation, for example *Singing the Faith* (StF) 124:

Reader 1: For the fruits of all creation,

All: thanks be to God;

Reader 2: for the gifts to every nation,

All: thanks be to God;

Reader 3: for the ploughing, sowing, reaping,
silent growth while we are sleeping,
future needs in earth's safe-keeping,

All: thanks be to God.

- If you're not used to leading worship, be aware that the 'Gathering in God's Presence' section of *Singing the Faith* is useful for choosing an opening hymn, and the 'Calling and Commissioning' section might help you choose the closing hymn.
- www.methodist.org.uk/our-faith/worship/singing-the-faith-plus is very useful for finding hymns that relate to themes, and there is a Bible reference index at the back of the music edition of the hymn book.

Reading hymns as prayers

Finally, it's worth spending some time, if you can, preparing how you will read your hymn-prayer.

Consider making an "I" hymn a "we" prayer, for example: "Show us how to stand for justice" (StF 713); "Breathe on us, Spirit of Jesus" (StF 371); "Forth in thy name, O Lord, we go" (StF 550).

One of the joys of reading a hymn without its tune is that it can refresh our experience of words that have become familiar to us. This is especially true if we read a phrase as whole, and don't simply pause at the end of each line of text. In many hymns, a single phrase or idea may flow through two or more lines. For example:

Hark! The herald-angels sing glory to the new-born King...

These two lines run as a single phrase, while the line break helps us find the right emphasis ("**Hark!** The herald-angels sing **glory** to the new-born King").

Or: *And can it be that I should gain an interest in the Saviour's blood?*

Similarly (to take another Christmas carol):

*Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light;
the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.*

By reading a hymn with care, and maybe adding more than voice, we can discover new meanings, and even find real drama in the unfolding words. For example, this particular carol ("O little town of Bethlehem") may become a whispered conversation between a group of wondering angels:

“How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given!”

“So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven.”

“No ear may hear his coming; but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him still the dear Christ enters in.”


(You will notice that for the suggestions in this booklet, some hymns are listed with more than just their first line. This is because, as in the examples above, the first line only makes real sense when the rest of the phrase is included.)

More hymns on Singing the Faith Plus

Included in the suggestions here are texts published on Singing the Faith Plus. This website was created at the same time as the hymn book, and is designed to support and complement the printed book. Amongst other things, it publishes hymns written since the book’s publication in 2011. Prayers at Holy Communion

The Methodist Worship Book offers a range of liturgies for celebrating Holy Communion. Some may be used all year round; others are designed to be used during specific seasons of the year. All contain prayers, and places where prayers may be used – and the hymn book is a good place to find suitable words.

Singing the Faith contains a substantial 'Holy Communion' section (hymns 568 to 602). Here, and elsewhere in the hymn book, you can find hymns appropriate to the different stages of this special meal:


- Prayers of confession (eg "Before I take the body of my Lord", *StF* 575)
- Before, during and after receiving the bread and wine (eg "Come, Lord, be our guest", *StF* 580; "Now let us from this table rise", *StF* 596)

Elsewhere, there are hymns appropriate to the Sharing of the Peace:
